Dear Parishioners,

On this second weekend in our month of October, the Church celebrates the 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Our readings for our Eucharist this weekend can be seen through the eyes of people who are stewards. God gives us so much, too many blessings to be counted. One of those blessings is that of health. In our first reading from the second book of Kings, we have the story of Naaman, the army general, a foreigner to Israel, and a man who was suffering from some kind of skin disease, often termed leprosy. Regardless of what the disease was, he seeks some kind of healing from the God of Israel, especially from the prophet Elisha. When he arrives on the scene, he was expecting to be greeted with much fanfare and much accommodations. But as the story goes, Elisha doesn't even come out to see him. Instead he bids him to go and wash in the Jordan River. Because of who he was, he never expected that answer and was brooding with hurtful pride and was willing to return to his home country. It wasn't until one of his retainers informed him that if the prophet had asked to do something great, he would have done so. But in this case, he was called to humble his pride, and do as the prophet requested. And when he did, Naaman found the healing for which he sought. In response to this blessing, he returned to the prophet and desired to share a gift with him for this healing. It is so natural for us all when we see what God has given, what God has done, that somehow we return to Him with thankful hearts and offer a share of our gifts to Him. That is stewardship at its highest form. When we realize what God has done for us, His many gifts including our time, our talents, and our treasures, then it is important that with thankful hearts we return a share in those blessings. To the extent that we do, we begin stewardship as a way of life. To further my point look at the gospel. Jesus heals ten people suffering from leprosy or some form of skin disease. Only one of them returns to Jesus after the healing to give Him thanks. It is at this point that Jesus says to this person, "Ten were cleansed, were they not? Where are the other nine? Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?" How many of us find ourselves aligned with the nine people who were given a gift, that of healing, and perhaps either expected it or presumed it? Hopefully, we can, like Naaman, humble ourselves and open our eyes to see what the Lord provides each and every day, and then become stewards by always thanking him and returning a portion to Him.

Next weekend, QND will be celebrating their homecoming. As is the custom, our young people will be coming to our 5:00 p.m. Mass to celebrate our Eucharist together before beginning their festivities. This will be a busy weekend as we also will be hosting Fr. Richard Kennedy, a Missionary of the Sacred Heart, who will be speaking at all our Masses in conjunction with the Missionary Co-Op plan of the diocese. I ask you to remain open to his message and with generous hearts respond to his appeal. There will be special envelopes placed in our pews for this collection. I ask you to place your donation in the special envelopes provided and then put it into our regular collection. Assisting with our monetary donations will keep us all involved with the missionary effort of our Church. So thank you in advance for making an effort to help with the missionary effort.



As I remain grateful for your generosity, I ask your full support, through prayer and sacrifice, on World Mission Sunday and throughout the year, as you are able.
