Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46; 1 Corinthians 10:31–11:1; Mark 1:40-45

Biblical leprosy was not usually Hansen's Disease. The term leprosy was applied to any highly contagious and awful looking skin disease, such as ringworm, scabies, impetigo, and so on. From experience, people knew that these diseases were contagious. Therefore they isolated a person until he was cured.

The isolation may seem very cruel to us, but we must remember that they did not know how to cure these diseases, and they didn't want anyone to be infected. There was a very elaborate ritual for declaring a "leper" cleansed; this may be found in Leviticus 14.

The Gospel tells of Jesus' cure of a leper. He stretched out his hand and touched him! This was forbidden by the Torah for obvious reasons. But Jesus has such compassion that he not only uses words to cure; he touches the afflicted man.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus does not want people to get the wrong idea of his messiahship; therefore he tells those he has cured to "keep it quiet." Unfortunately the cleansed leper shouts it to the roof tops. People press and crowd Jesus; he can scarcely move about freely.

The Church sees "sin" as the spiritual leprosy. Only Jesus can cure us. And he can cure us only if we want to be cleansed. Nowadays, too many people deny their leprosy. They act as if there is no sin; they deny that the Church has a right to teach on what is sin. If we would be cured, we must first admit our problem; then humbly approach the Lord.

The second reading urges us to offer everything for the greater honor and glory of God. We can give God glory at work, at play, at prayer, and in whatever we do. Let us always offer everything we are, have, say, and do for God's glory.

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, February 14, 2021

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend we celebrate the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time. As we celebrate this weekend, we take note of the fact that this will be the last Sunday in this time called "Ordinary." This Wednesday with the celebration of Ash Wednesday, we begin the season of Lent, followed by the Easter season. We will finally pick up again "Ordinary Time" on Monday, May 24. As we temporarily conclude Ordinary Time, the Church speaks this weekend of leprosy, a wretched disease that caused people to be outcast from their families and community. This leprosy was considered any type of skin disease which concerned the community enough to exclude these people for fear of being contagious to the people around them. And so Biblical leprosy often became a symbol of sin. The reason for this symbolism was the fact that sin is often contagious, meaning that it can lead others down the same path, often being the occasions of sin for others. It can also affect the community as sin often hurts people, sometimes the very people whom we love. Think of all those who cause harm to the lives of others through stealing, lying, and cheating. And unfortunately, we too often set these people aside, as they become outcasts living in prisons. The Biblical understanding of leprosy is a realistic symbol of sin in our lives.

This reading about leprosy is a great introduction to our season of Lent. Each of us is asked to enter this journey of Lent, with our hearts and wills in conjunction with each other as we confront the sins of our lives and with God's grace move to change our ways. The Church provides a number of opportunities for us to confront the leprosy of our lives, to acknowledge it, and to receive God's mercy and forgiveness as a way to change our lives. And so we begin this Ash Wednesday with Masses being celebrated at 8:30 a.m., 9:45 a.m. (at QND); 12:10 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. We ask again that you social distant yourselves and wear your masks. Then during Lent, we will be having an evening Mass each weeknight at 6:30 p.m., allowing people another opportunity to celebrate the Eucharist with us in a safe environment. We will also be offering the Sacrament of Reconciliation each weeknight before Mass, from 5:45-6:15 p.m. I ask you to read the Lenten regulations that are published in another part of this bulletin to know what is and what is not expected of you.

As we heed the Church's advice on almsgiving as part of our Lenten practice, I ask you to please take a "rice bowl" that is located in the Narthex. These rice bowls draw our attention to the plight of so many people who are poor throughout the world, praying for them and supporting them throughout sacrifices that we make during Lent. Please be generous with your sacrifices and prayers as this is truly a teaching moment for your children.

Also, during Lent, I will be offering a six week series on Thursday evenings following the Mass that will present Bishop Robert Barron's series on the Sacraments. Bishop Barron is what I would term a modern day Bishop Fulton Sheen as he is entertaining as well as very informative. After watching the video we hope then to have a question and answer period and promise to have you out of church by 8:00 p.m. Start with Mass and stay for this presentation.

As a way of encouraging parishioners to renew their devotion to the Eucharist, we are going to have Eucharistic Adoration in our Church each Sunday during Lent from 12:00 Noon to 6:00 p.m. People have been wondering and questioning when the Adoration Chapel will once again reopen. During this pandemic, I am not inclined to reopen it as the people who are the adorers are probably the most vulnerable. And I can't expect them to clean each hour of the time that it is open. Instead, we are going to try this Eucharistic Adoration in Church. This will give adorers an opportunity to be pray before the Eucharistic presence of Jesus in safe distance from each other. What a beautiful way to journey in Lent before our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The worldwide coronavirus outbreak restricted nonessential travel across the globe. Stay-at-home orders, physical distancing, and quarantine practices implemented to mitigate the spread of the disease revealed great and urgent needs, especially in those countries of Eastern Europe still in turbulent transition stages. There, weak economies were made more vulnerable, and those affected included the elderly as well as doctors, nurses, and medical chaplains. In Ukraine, the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC) came to the assistance of homebound senior citizens in many cities, using Church facilities to organize the work and engaging both local volunteers and assistance from abroad. Using the Lviv Patriarchal Center kitchen, volunteers prepared meals and delivered them to needy seniors throughout the city. In addition, the UGCC mobilized its network of about 120 hospital chaplains and collected and distributed badly needed protective clothing, masks, sanitizer, and other necessities to ensure their safety as they ministered to the sick throughout the country.

"When you know that someone cares about you and that you are not alone in your struggles," said Fr. Volodomyr Malchyn of the UGCC, "it is much easier to go through all kinds of challenges." Your participation in the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe expresses your care and support for the people in Ukraine and throughout the region, especially in times of crisis and disruption.

Please be generous to the collection, because your support helps foster nurturing communities in which Catholics can share and grow in faith. Lenten Regulations

The season of Lent begins this year on Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021 and ends just prior to the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, April 1, 2021, when the Paschal Triduum begins. Lent is the principal penitential season in the Church year. All the Christian faithful are urged to develop and maintain a voluntary program of self-denial (in addition to the Lenten regulations which follow), serious prayer and the performing of deeds of charity and mercy, including the giving of alms.

LENTEN REGULATIONS - Please share with your parishioners the following Lenten regulations:

- ABSTINENCE Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
- FAST Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed.

3. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

May this holy season be a time of spiritual renewal for each of us!


