Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, October 3, 2021

Dear Parishioners,

The month of October has finally arrived and with it comes a new season in the year, namely Autumn or what we also call Fall. This month hopefully will begin the changes of nature, and with these changes, we will see the beauty of God's creation in our midst. As the weather changes, and nature seems to be undergoing a dramatic change, God will paint the most beautiful picture with His array of colors found in nature. This is the time of the year that I am grateful for living in an area that does experience the four seasons of nature each and every year. I hope that each of you will find some time to absorb yourself in the beauty of creation and discover the beautiful picture that is painted each and ever Fall. Even though winter is right around the corner, let's not worry about that right now but be filled with awe as we experience nature changing before our eyes.

Our first reading for our Mass this weekend is that beautiful reading from the Book of Genesis that we hear at so many weddings. In that reading, we hear that it was God's intention for man not to be alone bur rather to have a suitable partner created for him. Man could not find that suitable in the created forms so "while he was asleep, He took out one of his ribs and built it up into a woman." And then this created man discovered his suitable partner. I was thinking to myself, how many of our married couples can continue to claim their spouses as their suitable partners for life. If not, why not? Yes, life brings many changes, and many challenges, but when there is a suitable partner with whom to share life, then it makes things bearable.

The other important part of this reading is found in the early part of this reading. It says that "God formed out of the ground various wild animals and various bird of the air, and He brought them to the man to see what he would call them; whatever the man called each of them would be its name." With this small statement, we hear the biblical author understanding giving claim to humankind's stewardship over created. God is the creator but by God giving humankind the ability to name the created creatures, God was giving stewardship over all creation to humans. It meant that human beings were not the creators, but were the caretakers, responsible to the Creator who gave creation to all of us for our use and enjoyment. In other words, we don't own creation, nor created objects, but by naming them we are responsible to protect and preserve them for all generation.

I want to welcome Msgr. Robert Tucker, a priest of the diocese of Lincoln, Nebraska, who will be with us this weekend. Msgr. Tucker led our annual leadership retreat on Saturday. He presented three talks with the overall theme being St. Joseph—the Good Steward. We thank him for his presentations as well as his challenge to us to be good stewards in our lives as St Joseph was in his life.

Our men's group will meet once again this Friday, October 8th, in the gym as they continue their sessions on the Holy Spirit. The doors open at 6:00 a.m. for coffee and a light breakfast, followed by a presentation and discussion from 6:30-7:30 a.m. The men are challenged to attend these sessions. We will be adding hours as we can, so please be aware of email and phone calls. We will be asking for a response from you to confirm hour and date.



Life Chain Sunday, October 3, 2021 at 2:30-3:30 pm

Please join with other area pro-life supporters in peaceful public witness as we stand for 60 minutes praying for our nation and for an end to abortion. Pick up your sign on the SW corner of 16th and Broadway between 2:00 and 2:30 pm. We ask that you position yourselves two arm's lengths apart along the South Side of Broadway between 14th and 18th Streets. Do not stand in groups. Bring a lawn chair only if unable to stand. This event is an opportunity to stand for life and is held in more than 1,400 cities in the United States.

Please remember this is an hour of silent prayer. For 34 years, pro-life Christians across the United States and Canada have publicly, prayerfully, and peacefully stood in prayer and repentance on behalf of legalized abortion each fall. From its small beginnings as a local witness in California, the Life Chain has spread to more than 2,000 locations all over North America. The first Sunday of each October is usually National Life Chain Sunday. We believe that it is time for the Church to fight for the unborn with spiritual weapons. The battle for life will not be won in the courtroom or the voting booth until it is first won in prayer. We call for pastors to lead the Church in repentance for our nation.
