Solemnity of Mary, The Holy Mother of God, January 1, 2023

Dear Parishioners,

Today we celebrate another Holyday, one of five in our liturgical calendar. This particular Holyday called the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God is probably the least attended because I would suggest people are celebrating the night or morning of in bringing in the New Year. Whatever the case, this Solemnity falls on a Sunday, thus providing the dignity that it deserves as one of our Holydays in our liturgical calendar. Now this particular Holyday has seen a number of changes in its celebration. When I was growing up, those older and perhaps a bit younger, remember this day being called the "the Feast of the Circumcision of Jesus." It was named that because our gospel for this feast said the following, "when eight days were completed for His circumcision, He was named Jesus, the name given Him by the angel before He was conceived in the womb." Then to call it the "Feast of the Circumcision" seemed to prioritize a Jewish practice and so then it was changed to Feast of the Octave Day of Christmas. After a short tenure of that celebration, the Church finally restored the ancient name for this Solemnity, namely the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. It is the oldest feast of the Blessed Mother in our liturgical calendar.

The scene of our gospel for this Solemnity is the stable at Bethlehem. We find Mary, Joseph, and the infant lying in the manger. Also present were the shepherds who, "made known to this family all that had been told them about the child." I am sure Mary was amazed to say the least, and as the gospel tells us, "Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart." Not sure in her reflection whether she understood that her motherhood would involve her in being called the Mother of God. And so we pray today, "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you, blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, MOTHER OF GOD, pray for us sinners now and at the hours of our death. Amen"

Besides celebrating this ancient Solemnity of Mary, we also celebrate the beginning of the New Year of 2023, in the year of the Lord. On behalf of the priests and parish staff, I want to wish each and everyone of you a very Blessed and Grace-filled New Year. Perhaps the blessing of Moses in our first reading is my prayer for you as Moses prayed:

May the Lord bless and keep you? May the Lord let His face shine upon you and be gracious to you; and May the Lord look upon you kindly and give you peace.

As I think about this particular day, I want you to know I am most thankful for this parish family. You have taught me so much about being a pastor, through your stewardship you have lifted some heavy burdens from my shoulders, and through your faith, hope, and love, helped me to find Christ in your lives as we struggle together to do His Will, not ours. I appreciate each of you and pray that this new year will be one of grace, joy, and happiness as we stive to serve each other and the God who became one of us. I also pray that each of us will keep our lives focused on the union with Christ, whether it be sacramentally in the Eucharist or someday when we pass through the doors of death to find His fullness.


Friend of Catholic Education Dinner

My dear Friends in Christ,

Catholic Times has always been a key communication tool for our diocese. Whether it is important announcements, teaching the faith, or inspirational stories, the magazine provides tremendous value to readers.

That was most apparent in the Nov. 27 special edition of *Catholic Times* that focused on the Eucharist, our Year of the Eucharist, and previewing the diocesan celebration of the See transfer from Alton to Springfield. That edition proved that not only do a lot of people read the magazine, but it is positively impacting people. Here are just two stories that prove the point: One is from Jerseyville where a reader told us that one of his friends, who is going through the RCIA process now, read the magazine "cover to cover" and "loved it" and now "understands" the Eucharist. In Springfield, a reader told us that he knew a gentleman who comes to Mass often and approached him. "He had a copy of the eucharistic miracles article from the recent special issue of *Catholic Times*. He told me he had been one of the 70 percent who thought the Eucharist was a symbol, but that after reading the article, and I assume the other articles in the special issue, he was now among the 30 percent who believed in the Real Presence." What God moments! We heard other stories of positive impact as well and received many requests for more copies of the special edition so readers could hand them to family, friends, and people searching for the Truth.

In 2022, *Catholic Times* won eight national awards at the annual Catholic Media Association Awards; the most the magazine has ever won during a single year. Moreover, the team at *Catholic Times* continues to try new things to engage readers. For example, this entire next year will feature eucharistic miracle stories, saint stories, and monstrances from across the diocese.

The magazine will also continue its emphasis on catechesis of the Catholic faith such as their Hey, Father! series, navigating the difficult world of bioethics, and explaining the sacraments. Of course, feature reporting is

a major part of the magazine, highlighting the stories of people, parishes, and schools that are building up the Kingdom of God in our diocese. The magazine's commitment to local coverage means when each edition is opened, readers will see stories that are important to their lives and read stories written by people and priests they know.

My column, "Lex Cordis Caritas," is on page 4 of each issue. It is one of the best ways that I can speak about the issues that we face as Catholics in Central Illinois and update readers on important decisions I make that impact the faithful. As bishop of this diocese, it is important for me to be an active participant in Catholic media.

It is all these reasons why I believe that *Catholic Times* should be available to every household in our diocese, either online (ct.dio.org), by email, or by mail. I invite you to support this important communication tool in our diocese. During the weekend of Jan. 7-8, you will have the opportunity to respond gratefully and ensure the *Catholic Times* remains an inexpensive source of information on the vital issues I have noted.
