The Epiphany of the Lord Solemnity, January 7, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

Today, we gather to celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany. This celebration brings our Christmas season to a close. A general theme for this Solemnity is found in the word light, and the phrase all generations will come to worship and bring gifts. To highlight these themes, the words of Isaiah the prophet are used in our first reading. "Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, and the glory of the Lord shines upon you. Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance. Raise your eyes and look about; they all gather and come to you. Caravans of camels shall fill you, dromedaries from Midian and Ephah; all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the Lord." With these words, our magi, or sometimes known as the Kings, now take their place as people from afar to give this newborn King praise and glory. They offer this child gold, to indicate His kingship; they offer Him frankincense, to proclaim His divinity; and they offer Him myrrh, to indicate His sacrificial death. This celebration is truly our Christmas, as the figurines that represent the non-Gentile world are placed in the crib scene as a reflection of each of us. We might ask ourselves, what is it that we offer this newborn king to proclaim our faith in Him? Hoping our offering this new year is our time, talents, and treasures through which we truly do proclaim that Jesus is the number one priority in our lives.

In the universal Church, the Solemnity of the Epiphany was always celebrated on the 12th day after Christmas, January 6th, thus having the 12 days of Christmas after and not before Christmas. And when celebrated on the 6th, this Solemnity of the Epiphany is a Holy Day of Obligation. But the Catholic Church in the United States transferred this Solemnity to the second Sunday following Christmas. Thus for us and the universal Church it is still a Holy Day. And a point of trivia, according to Venerable Bede (672-735) the Magi represented the three continents of Europe, Asia, and Africa, and the figurines depicted this in the colors of the Magi, being white, yellow, and black. And according to this same Bede their names were Melchior, Gaspar, and Balthasar. Whether there were three, two or more, the theme of our Mass is that this newborn King came for the entire humankind, bringing salvation, reconciliation and redemption to all of us. May each of us, like the Magi, give praise and glory to Him now and forever.

I also want to acknowledge the Duker & Haugh Funeral Home for their gift of our new parish calendars. Each year Ann Haugh and Jared Haugh donate these calendar for our use. If you haven't picked one up yet, we still have some in the narthex. And so on behalf of our parish family, I want to extend my thanks to these people for providing these calendars. If and when you see this family, please thank them for this gift each year.
